Connecting Northern British Columbia Youth to Canada's History Through the BC Heritage Fairs Program

Having received acceptance from The History Education Network/Histoire et Éducation en Réseau (THEN/HiER) of the proposal submitted by Rosaleen Boardman in September of 2010 and receiving approval for a Small Projects Grants in the amount of \$2500, the following report is herby submitted in accordance with the guidelines suggested. The initiative was to provide support to the British Columbia Heritage Fairs Society in offering a series of workshops for teachers and community-based educators in northern and eastern British Columbia to promote the activities of our society and increase participation in the provincial heritage fair program. Two such workshops were carried out by the Coordinator of BC Heritage Fairs, Mary Campone. The first workshop was in Fort St. John on January 31, 2011 and the second in Kimberly on April 15, 2011.

Approximately 23 educators attended which included 4 primary teachers and 3 secondary teachers with the majority being intermediate teachers. Elinor Morrisey from Hudson's Hope Museum attended as did the district Librarian. Overall, the tone of the workshop was extremely positive with many questions asked and participants were enthusiastic to know more and to make connections with others. When asked if anyone would be interested in serving in the Regional Fair Committee already established in Hudson's Hope, four hands went up. A date was set for the next Northern Regional Heritage Fair Committee meeting to be held in Hudson's Hope. The group was very interested in sharing the location of the Regional Fair, alternating each year.

While in Fort St. John, attempts were made to connect with the Superintendent, Larry Espe. Although he was not available, Assistant Superintendent, Lesley Lahaye, was able to meet with me. She was familiar with the Heritage Fairs Program as she acted as a judge for Northern Regional Heritage Fair the previous year!

Attempts to connect with Superintendent Kathy Sawchuck of Peace River South in Dawson Creek were unsuccessful.

I visited the Fort St. John North Peace Museum and met with the Managing Director, Heather Longworth who had not been able to attend the workshop but was interested in working collaboratively with local teachers. She was very receptive to taking the idea of sharing venues with Hudson's Hope on alternate years and hosting the Regional Fair to her Board for discussion.
