- * Using the Virtual Historian to Engage in Authentic Historical Tasks. Executive Board Member Stéphane Lévesque (University of Ottawa) is currently engaged with colleague Adam Friedman (Wake Forest University, North Carolina) in a comparative Canada-US study of high school student learning with technology. This SSHRC-funded research aims to uncover the particular ways in which Canadian and American teachers and students can learn in technology-connected settings. Read more.


