- * Visiting Doctoral Student Program Award. Congratulations to Ana Laura Pauchulo, a doctoral student at OISE/University of Toronto, who successfully completed her program from November 10 to 24, 2009 when she had the opportunity to visit the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta. The primary purpose of the visit was to collaborate with Dr. Kent den Heyer and other scholars in the faculty in considering the possible implications of her work with human rights groups in Argentina within a Canadian context. 

* Benchmarks of Historical Thinking. McGraw-Hill Ryerson has recently published a resource for



the Ontario Grade 10 Academic Canadian History course and for BC Social Studies 11 called Creating Canada: A History - 1914 to the Present that incorporates the historical thinking concepts from the Benchmarks project. Jill Colyer, Benchmarks Coordinator, is one of the authors; and Dr. Peter Seixas, Director of the Centre for the Study of Historical Consciousness at UBC, is the consultant for historical thinking concepts. McGraw-Hill Ryerson is also developing a resource for the new Manitoba Grade 11 Canadian History course that uses the historical thinking concepts.

* Canada's National History Society. The 2009 Winners of the Governor General's Awards for Excellence in Teaching Canadian History have been announced. They are:

Lindsay Hall - "Historical Sources for the 21st Century: Significant Canadian World War II Battles and Contributions."

Michel Marcotte - His film production project examines the relationship between New France and England.

Brent Pavey - "Making History: Understanding Canadian Government, Parliament and the Historical Development of Canadian Political Culture." **Neil Robinson** - He developed a comparative simulation game based on the board game "Settlers of Catan."

Neil Stephenson – In the "Cigar Box Project" students used 21st-century tools to reinterpret topics from five periods in Canadian history.

Alison England and Karen Wight - The "Longview Community Ranching Project" was based on local history in a rural community. Click here for more information.
