# "Perspectives, Past and Present, in the Social Studies Classroom": A History Teaching Conference

## **Summary:**

"Perspectives, Past and Present, in the Social Studies Classroom" was held at Mount Royal University (MRU) on February 16, 2012. Building upon the success of the conference held in 2011, this is the second annual event hosted by MRU in conjunction with the Calgary City Teachers' Convention. The one-day History teaching conference was a resounding success, attracting seventy-five participants, the majority of whom were elementary, junior and high school Social Studies teachers from Calgary. Education students from MRU and the University of Calgary also attended, as did MRU faculty and student volunteers.

The event succeeded in meeting its principal goals:

- Enhance how History is taught at the secondary and post secondary level
- Promote The History Education Network—three information items distributed and THEN/HiER was discussed
- Strengthen ties between secondary (and, to a lesser extent, elementary) and post secondary teachers in Calgary
- Promote historical consciousness as a key outcome of the Social Studies program in Alberta, and in turn better prepare students for the advanced study of history at the post-secondary level

#### **Keynote Address and Closing Session:**

The day began with a keynote address by Amy von Heyking, Associate Professor in the Faculty of Education at the University of Lethbridge. Professor von Heyking delivered an engaging presentation on historical empathy that examined the extent to which students can understand and identify with people in the past. The presentation also recommended various strategies that could be used to teach history from multiple viewpoints. This topic was well-suited to teachers in Calgary as the Alberta Social Studies program emphasizes teaching from "multiple perspectives."

The closing session, delivered by John Picard, Principal, and Elia Gindin, Teacher, Foundations for the Future Charter Academy, South Middle School in Calgary, addressed the challenges faced by competing ideas and pendulum swings in Education. Specifically, the application of "Historical Thinking Concepts" to Social Studies programs was explored.

As a result, Mount Royal University intends to hold similar events in the future. Future possibilities include widening the audience to include teachers from charter institutions and the Catholic Board, and holding the event in cooperation with the regional unit of the Alberta Social Studies Council, rather than the Teacher's Convention.
