# THEN/HiER Events

### Finding Franklin: New Approaches to Teaching Canadian History

This was THEN/HiER's final Annual Regional Conference and took place in Ottawa on June 4 and 5, 2015. The symposium featured speakers from the Great Unsolved Mysteries in Canadian History (GUMICH), the Nunavut Department of Education (NDE), Parks Canada, and the Centre for Oral History at Concordia University. Its focus was on new approaches to teaching and learning history through curriculum materials and a new GUMICH website

developed around the search for the missing Franklin ships, *The Franklin Mystery: Life and Death in the Arctic* (http://www.canadianmysteries.ca/sites/franklin/home/homeIntro\_en.htm).

Reconsidering Canadians' Ignorance of History

#### Raphaël Gani - Final Report

Some things do not change in the public discussion about history education, such as saying that Canadians don't know enough history after finishing school. Part of my research is to historicize the discourse about the ignorance of history with three broad questions: When, how, and why do Canadians repeatedly tell themselves that they are ignorant about history?



I presented my research findings to sessional teachers at the University of Alberta after attending their meeting on the challenges of teaching social studies courses with teacher candidates. During my presentation, I provided original data about large-scale surveys that quiz Canadians about their knowledge of history.

Survey after survey, about half of Canadians polled could identify Sir John A., but recent results show that this number is now up to 75%. Interest groups use these surveys to manufacture the ignorance of history discourse and ultimately to get their message heard.

Visiting the archives of the University of Alberta was helpful to support that argument. The Mel Hurtig fonds contain documents about his Canadian Awareness Survey (1975) that was cited by Jack Granatstein in *Who Killed Canadian History?* as prime evidence of mass historical ignorance. In the archives, by looking at the original pilot study of that survey, I found that the majority of the 300 students polled (77%) could identify the first PM of Canada. Hurtig didn't include a John A. question in the final version of the survey, which was distributed to 3,500 Canadian students, probably because it did not spark enough ignorance. I also presented these results at the University of Calgary following an invitation from David Scott, the newly hired director of student experience at the Werklund School of Education's community-based B.Ed. program.

The backdrop of my doctoral project is the discourse on the ignorance of history and the norms it reinforces about the obligation to know and memorize history. I seek to understand how pre-service teachers navigate that norm. Do they know, with certainty, what they find relevant about Canada's history? Answering that question could give teacher educators clues about why pre-service teachers don't know historical facts (they don't find a particular fact relevant), targets of intervention (the fact was ignored but deemed relevant to know), and areas of real concern ("knowing," with certainty, incorrect facts). I'm currently completing my comprehensive exams. See http://thenhier.ca/en/content/reconsidering-canadians-ignorance-history for the entire report.

THEN/HiER provided bursaries of up to \$750 for ten people to attend the 2015 Historical Thinking Summer Institute which took place at the Museum of Vancouver and UBC-Vancouver campus from July 6 to 11.

The summer institute was designed for teachers, graduate students, curriculum developers, professional development leaders and museum educators wishing to enhance their expertise at designing and teaching history courses and programs with explicit attention to historical thinking. Participants explored the six historical thinking concepts through the substantive themes of migrations, contact and cultural exchange over time.




